Dear Family:

Good news! Your child has just attended the San Ramon Valley Fire Protection District's 1st and 2nd grade fire safety education program.

In this lesson, your child learned the importance of being **Safety Smart at Home**. It is very important your child knows they can always be on the lookout for hazards in the home and if they find a hazard to tell their parents.

Your child learned to **never overload an electrical outlet** because it could overheat and cause a fire. They learned to check for frayed electrical wires and to never place electrical cords under a rug.

Your child also learned a variety of ways to help themselves and others to avoid injuries. Some of the ways are as follows:

- to never cook alone,
- to always keep space heaters at least 3 feet away from flammable items, and
- to never cover a lamp shade when the light is on.

Each household should perform a home fire safety inspection using the checklist provided with this letter. Your house will be considered fire safe with you answering "Yes" to the checklist questions.

Great! Your house is fire safe. Now all you need to do is practice your fire safety plan and make sure your children learn their name, address and phone number in case they need to call 9-1-1.

I hope you and your child have enjoyed our fire safety education program and that you review these life-saving lessons together often. Please call me if you have any questions.

Home Fire Safety Checklist

Score a fire safety home run — do a home fire safety inspection!

Striking out fire in your home requires a little homework. Take about 20 minutes to inspect your home. As you go from room to room, answer the questions below. For each question you answer "yes" to, give yourself a point. When you're finished, add up the points to find out your score. Kids, ask a grown-up to help you complete this checklist!


What's Your Fire Safety Batting Average?



If you answered "yes" to all of the checklist questions above, congratulations! You scored a fire safety home run!




